Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Era Eugene (Gene) Callahan was born on November 5th, 1933 in Milford, Illinois, and grew up on his father's small hog farm outside Milford. His father was the Democratic County vice-chairman for Iroquois County, traditionally a Republican stronghold. Callahan attended Illinois College majoring in English, developed a passion for journalism, and graduated in 1955. Following two years in the army, Callahan returned to central Illinois and worked as a reporter, and later a columnist for the Illinois *State Register* (the Democratic leaning newspaper in Springfield, IL) until 1967. In 1968 he worked as an assistant press secretary for Governor Sam Shapiro, and from 1969-1972 he worked as press secretary for Lt. Governor Paul Simon, a Democrat serving with Republican governor Richard Ogilvie.

Following Simon's unsuccessful bid for governor in 1972, Callahan was hired by Alan Dixon in 1974. Dixon was IL State Treasurer at the time, then served as Secretary of State from 1977-1980, before being elected to the U.S. Senate in 1980. Callahan stayed with Dixon through all of these positions, becoming the Senator's Chief of Staff and most trusted advisor. When Dixon was defeated in a three-way Democratic primary in 1992 by Carol Mosley Braun, Callahan soon found work as the chief lobbyist for Major League Baseball, working to preserve baseball's antitrust exemption. His tenure there lasted until 1998, and included the strike from August, 1994 to April, 1995. Gene passed away on August 4, 2014.
