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Abstract Dr. Michael Jacoby-Illinois Public School Funding

Biographical Information/Overview of Interview: Dr. Michael Jacoby was born in 1958 in Blair, Nebraska. He graduated from high school in Platteville, Wisconsin in 1976 and went on to earn a BA degree in Music Education from the University of Iowa, a Masters' degree from Illinois State University, and a Ph.D. from Northern Illinois University. He taught vocal music at Morris High School from 1980 to 1986 and then went to Geneva as chief financial officer, later serving as the district's superintendent of schools until 2006. Since 2006 Dr. Jacoby has served as the Executive Director of the Illinois Association of School Business Officials (IASBO). He served on the Classroom First Commission which examined Illinois school reorganization. Dr. Jacoby is Executive Director of the Illinois which developed twenty-three recommendations for future school reorganizations.

In this interview, Dr. Jacoby discusses the efforts to replace the foundation school funding model with one which is evidence based, using over twenty-seven specific criteria needed for a quality education. Jacoby discussed the former funding model and how prorationing that occurred in 2008 hurt the poorest Illinois School Districts. He explains how an effort by Vision 20/20 led by Illinois Educational Management groups and many non-profits helped create a state wide effort for change. He went into detail on the legislative efforts from 2014-2017 which culminated in Senate Bill 1 & SB 16 as well as others. The result was SB 1947, which became law. Finally, Jacoby also discussed the Rauner Commission, which made recommendations leading to the passage of a new funding model.
