Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Linda Connelly was born in 1952, and graduated from Sterling High School in Sterling, Illinois in 1970. During high school, Connelly was active in the Girls' Athletic Association, where she participated in tennis, basketball, cycling, and softball. Her physical education teachers for these activities were Sue Strong and Sharon Douthart. She earned her bachelor's degree in physical education from Northern Illinois University in 1974.

After college, Connelly began teaching and coaching at Mattoon High School in Mattoon, Illinois in the fall of 1974. She was the girls' tennis coach and the first girls' basketball coach at Mattoon. Connelly coached both the girls' varsity and junior varsity teams without any assistance. She remembers feeling extremely young, inexperienced, and isolated during her three years at Mattoon. However, despite her inexperience, Connelly led her 1977 girls' basketball team to the first Illinois state girls' basketball tournament where her high school physical education teacher Sue Strong was one of the other seven coaches whose team qualified for the finals. Sue Strong's Sterling team would win that first championship. That was the last year Connelly coached and taught at Mattoon High School.
