Abstract

Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Francis Walle was born on October 26, 1912 in Piper City, Illinois and grew up on a small farm nearby. In early 1942 he was working for Farm Service when he was drafted. While in basic training, he was selected to attend the Field Artillery Officer Basic Course at Ft. Sill, Oklahoma. Once commissioned, he was assigned to the 97th Infantry Division, which was then stationed in the United States. In August, 1944 Lieutenant Walle shipped out of New York City for England as an individual replacement. The following month he landed on Omaha Beach, and spent several weeks at Fontainebleau, France waiting for an assignment. On Thanksgiving day he was sent to a forward replacement depot and was then assigned as a forward observer to the 310th Field Artillery, part of the 79th Infantry Division.

Lieutenant Walle, while with the 79th Division, saw action in the Lorraine region of France before heading north and east into Germany in February; the 79th Division was now part of Simpson's Ninth Army. After the Nazis surrendered, he served on occupation duty in the Ruhr region of German. By October, 1945 he was reunited with his family back in Illinois. Mr. Walle passed away on August 23, 2014 at the age of 101.
