## Evelyn O. Fields, Veterans Remember, VR2-A-L-2011-005

**Biographical Information Overview of Interview:** Evelyn Oberg was born on March 31st, 1923 in Cuming County, Nebraska, and grew up on the family's small farm near Bancroft, Nebraska. She grew up in rural Nebraska during the dust bowl, and attended a one-room schoolhouse. Because of her family's isolation and poor road conditions, she could not attend high school. Instead, she attended the Commercial Extension School in Omaha, Nebraska. As a small child, Evelyn remembers hearing about the Italians (Mussolini) invading Ethiopia, about Hitler going into Poland, and much more. In August of 1942 she found work in Washington, D.C. as a clerk-typist in the Adjutant General's Office. She then moved to Newark, New Jersey, where she worked for the Office of Dependency Benefits, and in 1943 moved to Chicago and began working for the Army Regional Accounting Office.

She soon met William C. Fields, a young sailor assigned to the Great Lakes Naval Training Center north of Chicago, who had received training as a teletype operator. The two were married in February of 1944 shortly before he shipped out to the Pacific, assigned to the destroyer USS Putnam. For the rest of the war Evelyn worked for the Office of Price Administration (OPA) in Pender, Nebraska. The interview highlights both Evelyn's experiences with the OPA, and many of the diary entries, letters and mementos she received from Bill while he was in combat in the Pacific. Once Bill returned to the United States after the war, the couple moved first to Memphis, Tennessee, where Evelyn continued to work for the OPA, then in December of 1946 they moved to Florida, where they lived for many years, running a jewelry store for most of those years. Evelyn passed away on March 28, 2020, in Asheville (Buncombe County), North Carolina.
