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Abstract

Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Sue Strong was born on December 9, 1939 in Chicago, Illinois. She graduated from Maine Township High School in Des Plaines, Illinois in 1957. During high school there were no interscholastic sports for girls so Strong participated in the Girls' Athletic Association (GAA). Following high school she earned a bachelor's degree in physical education from Simpson College in Indianola, Iowa. Strong also has a graduate degree from Northern Illinois University.

She began teaching physical education at Sterling High School in Sterling, Illinois in 1966. During this time, Strong was in charge of sports through the G.A.A. She ran the GAA until the 1973-74 school year when Sterling High School created a girls' basketball program and she became the head coach. The school was very supportive of girls' sports being added and in helping Strong with whatever she needed. In 1977, Strong led her team to the first girls' basketball state tournament where her team won the inaugural Illinois High School Association State Championship for girls' basketball.
