# Kenneth Shaw, Education is Key, EH-A-L-2020-005

Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Dr. Kenneth A. 'Buzz' Shaw is a nationally respected administrator and educator. He was born in Granite City, Illinois in January 1939, and grew up in Edwardsville, Illinois where he played basketball in junior high and high school. He continued playing basketball at Illinois State University (ISU) where he obtained a B. S. degree in 1961. Following graduation, Shaw taught history at Rich Township High School in Park Forest, Illinois and in 1963 earned an Ed.M. degree from the University of Illinois in Urbana-Champaign. While in Park Forest he met his wife, Mary Ann. Dr. Shaw went on to earn a Ph.D. at Purdue University, then returned to Bloomington, Illinois where he served as assistant to the president of ISU. In 1969 he moved east and became Vice President and Dean of Towson State University. In 1977 he returned home and became president of Southern Illinois University's Edwardsville campus. In 1979 he was offered the Chancellor job at SIU, a position that expanded his authority over all SIU campuses. He left SIU in 1986 when he was offered the opportunity to become president of the University of Wisconsin system overseeing twenty-six campuses. In 1991 he left Wisconsin and became Chancellor and President of Syracuse University in New York, where he led a comprehensive re-structuring process. Retiring in 2004, Dr. Shaw taught leadership at Syracuse for seven years before returning to Illinois and working with the Association of Governing Boards (AGB) from 2005 to 2019.
