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Abstract

Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Patrick Lam was born on January 20, 1972 in Saigon, Vietnam (formerly South Vietnam). At the age of 7, Patrick left Lai Thieu (45 miles northeast of Saigon, now Ho Chi Minh City) in a wooden junk with several of his aunts. After being lost at sea for a week, the family happened upon an oil rig, and the oilmen then took them to the island of Kuku, which was a part of Indonesia. At that time, KeuKeu was a deserted island. Patrick and his aunts, who were now classified as "boat people", stayed there for several months, surviving on fish and supplies brought by relief agencies. Patrick and his aunts were taken by a relief agency to Hong Kong, Singapore, and finally to San Francisco. They remained in San Francisco for one day before moving to Port Arthur, Texas. Shortly thereafter, Patrick and his aunts moved to Rogers Park in Chicago. As jobs became available, they moved out of the city and into various suburbs, including Palos Park, Sullivan, and Palatine.

While he was growing up, Patrick frequently switched grade schools and high schools as his family moved around the Chicago suburbs. After finishing high school, he attended Harper College before transferring to the University of Kansas, where he received a Bachelor of Science degree in Biology. Upon completing his undergraduate career, Patrick went to Saba University in the Dutch Caribbean, where he obtained his MD. Patrick met his wife, Mary, while he was doing his clinical internship in the United States. Patrick currently lives in Chatham, Illinois with his wife and two daughters, Isabella and Melodie. He now works as a director at Reflections, an assisted living facility in Chatham for Alzheimer's patients.
