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Abstract

Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Helen (Laugher) Koser was born on October 30th, 1921 in Birmingham, England, the daughter of a British officer and WW I veteran who died when Helen was three years old. Helen grew up with her mother and grandfather, and attended the St. Augustine Primary School, a Catholic school, until age 14. After two years of high school, she worked for a while, then returned to school to work toward a nursing degree. Helen discussed the mood in England as war approached, and her memories about Birmingham being bombed during the Battle of Britain, and the V-1 and V-2 attacks on England after that.

In 1944 she met John Hambley, who was convalescing in Birmingham, following an air raid. The two dated until John returned to the war in France, and John proposed to her in a letter while at the front. John hoped to return to England to marry Helen after the war, but was shipped home to the United States instead. Helen finally flew to New York City in January of 1947, then took the train to Chicago, where she met John and his brothers. They drove to the small farm near Polo, Illinois, and were married two weeks later. Helen discussed her adjustment to life in America, and her life in Dixon.
