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Abstract

Biographical Information/Overview of Interview: Neil Steinberg was born in Cleveland, Ohio in 1960. He grew up in Berea, a suburb of Cleveland, graduating from high school in 1978. Neil then attended Northwestern University, majoring in journalism, with an interest in Cold War history as well. Upon graduating from Northwestern in 1982, Neil worked for local papers in Green Bay, Wisconsin, Barrington, Illinois and Wheaton, Illinois. He also did work in California before joining the Chicago Sun-Times in 1987. At the Sun-Times, Neil writes columns three to four times per week. In addition, he has written nine books including The Alphabet of Modern Annoyances, You Were Never in Chicago, and Don't Give Up the Ship: Finding My Father While Lost at Sea. Neil has also published articles in Esquire, The New York Times Sunday Magazine, Rolling Stone, Sports Illustrated, National Lampoon, Salon, the Chicago Reader and New York Daily News.

Steinberg looks at the role of a columnist for a daily paper. He discusses how he generates ideas for a column, picture development, selection for a title, and the location and space allotted for a column or story in the newspaper. Also discussed were challenges facing journalism today, including newspaper ownership, the rise of in social media, staff reductions, and what is considered to be facts vs opinion. Steinberg also looks at high school civics education and what a columnist guest speaker might wish to convey about journalism. Another area he covered was the current movement to stifle the debate of different ideas and speakers on university campuses. Finally, the Steinberg looks at the history of the Chicago *Sun-Times*.
