**Biographical Information/Overview of Interview:** Dr. Richard (Dick) Wagner was born on February 10, 1938 in Eureka, Illinois. Dick grew up in Chenoa, Illinois and is the son of Ezra and Lorene Wagner. He went to college at Bradley University, earning a Bachelors in Psychology in 1960. At Bradley he met and married Judy Block from Knoxville, Illinois. After earning his bachelor's degree, Dick and Judy moved to Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania where Dick earned two degrees at the University of Pittsburgh, an MPA in 1961 and a Ph.D. in 1967. After obtaining his Ph.D., Dick worked for the University of Maryland for three years.

Dr. Wagner returned to Illinois with his family in 1969 working for six weeks in the new Bureau of the Budget, an entity created by Governor Richard Ogilvie, followed by a six-week internship with state Senator Russell Arrington. In this role, Dick provided staff support to the Senate Republican leader during the passage of Illinois' first income tax. He then joined the staff of the Illinois Board of Higher Education (IBHE) that same year, 1969, as Deputy Director for Fiscal Affairs. From 1975 to 1980 he served as the IBHE's Deputy Executive Director and in 1980 was appointed Executive Director. He is the longest serving head of the IBHE since its creation in 1961. Dick retired from the IBHE in 1998. Dick and Judy are parents to four children, Judson, Whitney, and twins Peter and John.
