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Abstract

Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Fred Visel was born in Medzev, Slovakia in 1943. As a refugee during World War II, Fred briefly attended schools in Germany before the family moved to Cleveland, Ohio. He graduated from Parma Senior High School in Parma, Ohio in 1961. He earned a bachelor's degree from Bowling Green State University in 1965. Fred served in the U.S. Army, eventually achieving the rank of lieutenant colonel. He also earned a master's degree in history from the University of Iowa and a master's degree in Instructional Centers from Illinois State University. In 1971, after serving in Vietnam, he joined the faculty of Carl Sandburg College, a new community college located in Galesburg, Illinois. At Carl Sandburg College he taught history and government and served as dean of the library for fifteen years. Upon his retirement in 1999, Fred returned to teaching as a part-time instructor of history.

Visel discusses the history of Carl Sandburg College from 1971 to 2013 and how history and government were taught during his tenure at the school.
