## **Abstract**

**Biographical Information Overview of Interview:** Robert George Frederick Spitze was born in Berryville, Arkansas on October 12, 1922. After his junior year in college in 1943, Spitze reported for naval training. He trained at the University of Arkansas, Arkansas Agricultural & Mechanical College, and Columbia University in New York. After being commissioned as an Ensign, Spitze returned home briefly to marry his fiancé. He trained on the Landing Ship Tank (LST) USS 730.

His crew trained and was eventually formed in Camp Bradford, Virginia. Spitze served on the LST 642, which was commissioned in Seneca, and eventually launched in the Illinois River. While aboard tank, Spitze was a radio and communications officer. Spitze's naval crew was involved in the invasions at Iwo Jima and Okinawa; the crew helped deliver supplies and marines onto the Japanese mainland. Next, while preparing on the Philippines for the invasion of Japan, Spritze received word that the war had ended.

In 1960, Spitze and his family moved to Urbana, Illinois. He became a professor at the University of Illinois.
