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Abstract

Biographical Information/Overview of Interview: Gerald (Jerry) Raschke was born on August 28, 1924 in Omaha, Nebraska, where his father worked in the rail yards. In June 1943 he joined the Army Air Force, leaving his sweetheart behind in Omaha, and received training as a machine gunner on a B-26 Marauder medium bomber. Once his training was complete, Airman Raschke and his crew were sent to the Mediterranean Theater and assigned to the 320th Bomb Group, which was then stationed on the Italian island of Sardinia.

On one of the first missions Raschke's pilot flew in August 1944, he was killed. Because of that, Raschke's crew was split up, and he ended up flying on a variety of aircraft over then next year. While stationed at Sardinia Raschke's bomb group flew missions over Italy, mostly attacking bridges, rail yards, ammunition dumps, troops concentrations and other targets near the front lines. Later in 1944 the 320th moved to Corsica, part of France, and continued to fly missions over Italy. In November 1944 the unit moved to Longvic, near Dijon, France. Raschke eventually flew sixty-one missions before being sent home in late April 1945. During those missions the aircraft he was on crash landed three times, but no one on his aircraft was ever injured or killed, although the unit suffered heavy losses, both in the air and on the ground. Raschke was in England on May 8 when the war in Europe ended. By July he was back home, and in 1946 married Mildred Astleford, the sweetheart he had left behind. Many years later, Jerry wrote a memoir about his experiences, which included the mission records for almost all of his flights.
