Biographical Information Overview of Interview: This interview is a continuation of an interview series with Vincent Speranza, a 101st Division paratrooper and veteran of the Battle of the Bulge. The interview was conducted in conjunction with a book signing for Vincent's autobiography *Nuts! A 101st Airborne Division Machine Gunner at Bastogne*. The evening started with a short PowerPoint presentation by Mark DePue, followed by Vince talking about his wartime experiences, to a packed audience in the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Museum's Union Theater. The evening concluded with a short question and answer period, where the audience heard several more stories from Vince.

Vince was born on March 23, 1925 in the Hell's Kitchen neighborhood of Manhattan, New York. He grew up on Staten Island in a large and extended Italian family during the Depression and was inducted into the Army in October, 1943. He served with the 501st Parachute Infantry Regiment, 101st Airborne Division, and saw action at Bastogne during the Battle of the Bulge and in Germany.
