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Abstract

Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Sherril (Sherry) Struck was born Sherry Williams on October 15th, 1949 in Bloomington, Illinois. He father passed away when she was ten, so times were challenging for Sherry's family when growing up. Upon graduation from Bloomington High School in 1967, she began working for the Illinois Farm Bureau, whose headquarters was in town. She stayed with the Farm Bureau until 1979 when she and her husband, Earl Struck, moved to Springfield, Illinois. She began working for the Illinois Coal Association in 1980.

When the couple moved to Springfield, they soon met their new neighbors, Jim and Brenda Edgar. Edgar was then Governor Thompson's legislative liaison, but was soon appointed as the IL Secretary of State. The couples became close friends, with their children growing up in the Hyde Park neighborhood of Springfield, a typical middle-class suburban neighborhood. When Edgar made a run for Governor in 1980, he asked Sherry, a political novice, to serve as Comptroller for the campaign. Following his victory in a tight race, Edgar asked her to serve as his personal assistant.

Sherry stayed in that role for the next eight years, working at the desk outside Governor Edgar's office, screening visitors, handling all of his personal correspondence, plus a myriad of other duties and responsibilities. Although not involved in policy issues, she was one of the most trusted members of his team. She spoke about the budget crisis Gov Edgar faced during the first administration, about her memories of other members of the administration, about the 1994 election, Edgar's heart problems, and the MSI scandal late in the second administration.
