Abstract

Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Peter Goldsmith was born on August 16th, 1959 in Stanford, Connecticut, and grew up there until age seventeen, when his father moved to a small farm in New Jersey. Peter majored in Political Science at Kenyon College, in Gambier, Ohio, where he earned a B.A. degree. During two summers he participated in a guest farmer program on a dairy farm in northern Norway. In 1983 he also earned a B.S. degree from the Ohio State University in Dairy Science, then joined the Peace Corps working on agricultural projects in Ecuador. He earned an M.B.A. in 1990 from Xavier University, and an MA in Economics and a Ph.D. in Agricultural Economics from the Ohio State University in 1995. In 1999 Peter moved to Champaign, Illinois and began working at the National Soybean Research Center located on the University of Illinois campus. In 2006 he became the executive director of the center, and specializes on the marketing and international aspects of the institution.

Goldsmith discussed the dynamics of the world-wide soybean market, and the impact of the burgeoning Brazilian soybean production during a time of expanding demand for soybeans and their derivative products, especially in China, India and emerging Asian markets. He compared soybeans and corn as major commodities, and the relative merits of biodiesel as fuel versus ethanol based fuels. Goldsmith also discussed the dynamics behind the determining commodity prices for soybeans, explaining some of the fluctuations we've experienced over the last several years.
