Abstract

Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Thomas (Tom) Bowman was born on May 9th, 1947 in Springfield, Illinois, and grew up on the north side of Springfield in a large Catholic family. He was interviewed in 2014 about his experiences as a medic in the 44th Medical Brigade during the Vietnam War, and in 2004 about his years in the Illinois Army National Guard following the Vietnam War, especially about his command of the 233rd Military Police Company in Springfield, Illinois. These interviews are also available in the ALPL Oral History Program collection. This interview briefly covers Bowman's career in the Illinois Army National Guard from 1990 through 2005.

In 2005 Colonel Bowman was selected to command a group of seventeen Illinois Army National Guard officer who deployed to Iraq. That force, entitled the Joint Forces Headquarters Forward 9, worked as an American Army liaison team to the Multinational Division which was responsible for an area of Iraq south and east of Baghdad. The area encompassing nearly 32,000 kilometers, with a population of over 3.34 million people, mostly of the Shia faith. The division's commander and its largest contingent was Polish, but eleven other nations had contingents in the division as well. The division was responsible for the security of the region until January, 2006 when the Iraqi government took over those duties following an Iraqi election. The division oversaw some 2,200 civil-military project in the region during its tenure. Colonel Bowman's specific duty was to work directly with the division's senior command element, and to oversee the other Illinois officers, who were assigned to various staff sections throughout the division. The group's tour in Iraq was from May 2005 to May 2006.
