Abstract

Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Marilyn (Dotta) Nash was born on February 19th, 1957 in the St. Louis, Missouri area. She attended the University of Missouri with the goal of becoming a veterinarian, but graduated instead with an undergraduate degree in animal sciences. She found work in Nebraska at the USDA Animal Research Center, dealing with "everything to do with sheep." She followed her husband Tom Nash to Kansas State where he worked on his Masters Degree. Their next stop was in Southern Illinois, where Marilyn did database entry on her husband's sheep research flock. Following that, they moved to Urbana-Champaign, Illinois, where she was in the Ph.D. program in the College of Veterinary Medicine, receiving a degree in Veterinary Pathobiology, Epidemiology in 1999. Marilyn began working at the National Soybean Research Laboratory in 1996, where she currently works as a program coordinator, specializing in finding new ways to utilize soybean products in cooking.

Marilyn discussed the wide variety of ways in which soy products can be incorporated into our diet, especially soy milk, two varieties of tofu, and soy flour. She emphasized the versatility and health benefits of textured soy protein, and discussed the challenges of introducing these products into both the domestic market as well as internationally. She also discussed the use of soybean miso in soups and other applications. Marilyn addressed how recipes needed to be adjusted to accommodate the addition of soy products, but also stressed the health and nutritional benefits of soy products, especially due to the high concentration of beneficial proteins. She noted that in 2007 the NSRL kitchens won the annual Game Day Chili competition with their vegetarian recipe.
