**Biographical Information Overview of Interview:** Chris Voelz was born on May 29, 1949 in Geneva, Illinois. She graduated from West Chicago High School in Chicago, Illinois in 1966. She was the president of the Girls' Athletic Association (G.A.A)club at her high school, participated in the Postal Tournament; playing field hockey, volleyball, basketball, and softball. Voelz earned her bachelor's degree from Illinois State University (ISU) in physical education and social anthropology in 1970. She also earned her master's degree from Northern Illinois University in secondary education and sports psychology in 1974. As an undergrad at ISU, Voelz played one year of golf, two years of softball, four years of volleyball, and four years of basketball.

Voelz taught and coached at Maine South High School in Illinois from 1970 to 1978, coaching volleyball, softball, and basketball. In 1988, Voelz began her job as the Women's Athletic Director at the University of Minnesota. She fought everyday to earn better treatment for female athletes at the U. of Minnesota. After leaving the University of Minnesota, Voelz began working for the Women's Sports Foundation. (Billie Jean King founded the Women's Sports Foundation, which is an organization that fights against discrimination in sports and for equality in sports.) Voelz has spent her life either playing sports or advocating for women's sports.
