Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Emil Jones, Jr. was born on October 18, 1935 in Chicago, Illinois. Jones graduated from Chicago's Tilden Technical High School, then Chicago Loop Junior College and Chicago State University. He later attended Roosevelt University, where he majored in business administration and received a Doctorate of Humane Letters Honoris Causa degree in 2004. He began his political career in Chicago via grass roots ward politics. Jones served as a member of the General Assembly from 1973 to 2009. As a member of the Illinois House of Representatives from 1973 to 1983, he served as an assistant minority leader and chair of the Insurance Committee. He was elected to the Illinois Senate in 1982 and served as a member of the Senate Executive Committee, as well as vice-chair of the General Assembly Retirement System's Board of Trustees.

From 1993 through 2002, Jones served as the senate minority leader. He became majority leader in 2003, a position he held until 2008. He supported social justice and fair and adequate funding of public education in Illinois. It was during this time that he worked with Governor Rod Blagojevich and mentored Illinois State Senator Barack Obama.
