Biographical Information Overview of Interview: James O'Boye was born on May 25th, 1947 in Chicago, Illinois and grew up on the south side of Chicago. He started high school at Mt. Carmel, Illinois and graduated from Little Flower High School, a parochial school in Chicago in 1965. Due to his interest in sports, Jim found work at some small radio stations in Indiana following his training at the Chicago Career Academic School Broadcasting (1969). He was a disc jockey, sports play by play announcer, news reporter, and salesman. Jim next moved to Grand Rapids, Michigan where he worked in radio sales. Jim returned to Chicago and worked for several major radio stations and radio networks, including the Mutual Broadcasting System, Keystone Broadcasting System, and WMAQ. In 1988, Jim decided to form his own company with a partner. Thus, KOST Broadcast Sales was formed. The company specialized in high school and professional sports. In 1991, KOST obtained the rights to broadcast the Illinois high school state tournaments, first in basketball and then football. This was Jim's first effort at major television network broadcasting. The company had a partnership with the Illinois High School Association from 1991-1997 and again from 2000-2010. In addition, Jim created a high school game of the week in the Chicago land area and produced America's original March Madness series for IHSA. KOST also broadcast championships in soccer, wrestling, and volleyball. At the time of this interview, Jim served as the public address announcer for St. Rita High School (Chicago). Jim has received numerous awards in broadcasting including the IHSA Media Service Award (2015).

O'Boye discusses the creation and expansion of broadcasting the Illinois High School Association championships in girls/boys basketball and football for almost two decades. He also addresses how the IHSA selected KOST Broadcast Sales to do its broadcasts. O'Boye talks about the role of the television executive producer in selecting directors, announcers, color commentators, cameramen, technicians, cable operators and graphics personnel. He also discusses the game of the week shows, and March Madness, a term that originated in Illinois.
