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## **Abstract**

Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Robert (Bob) Muzikowki was born in Bayonne, New Jersey in March 1957. Bob grew up in Bayonne and graduated from Marist High School. While at Marist he was active in an organization which brought Christians and Jews together. He then attended Columbia University, majoring in political science and comparative literature. He also played football at Columbia. He earned a BA in 1979, and a masters' degree in 1982 from the Columbia School of International Affairs. Bob then worked for New York City, dealing with labor affairs and union contracts for the fire department, then as a financial planner for Northwestern Mutual. He later moved to Chicago and worked as a financial planner for his own company, Benefit Planning Inc. In 2004, he sold his business and devoted his energies to create Chicago Hope Academy, a college and life preparatory school located in the North Lawndale area of the near west side of Chicago. Bob is also well known in Little League Baseball circles for his promotion of youth leagues which serve the near north and near west sides of Chicago. (1991-1995). Bob has been recognized for his volunteer efforts, including receiving the Points of Light Award from President George H.W. Bush in 1991, the Little League Volunteer of the Year award, the Youth Services Award (with wife Tina) from the Department of Housing and Urban Development, and the Bradford-One Medallion for Social Justice. Bob also authored, Safe at Home in 2001, which tells the story of the creation of youth baseball on the west side of Chicago. That story was also told by Daniel Coyle in Hardball: A Season in the Projects. The movie Hardball was made, with Keanu Reeves playing Muzikowski.

Bob discussed the creation of Chicago Hope Academy in 2005, located in a former Catholic school, St. Callistus. He charted the school's gradual expansion over the next fourteen years, including a new wing of classrooms and a reception area, an athletic field, a basketball stadium and a new all-weather track. A new high school building is scheduled to open in 2021 with the old high school then serving. as a K-8 school. This will allow the high school to expand to 600 students. Muzikowski also discussed the school funding sources including rehabbing houses, student enrollment, tuition/scholarships/work experiences. He also talked about boarding students, the rigorous curriculum, religious studies, the yearly service projects, a week-long retreat to begin the school, student athletics and activities, teacher recruitment, school governance, the role of parents, and connections with the business community. To date, all of the school's graduates have gone on to attend college or pursue a military career.
