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Abstract

Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Lorene Ramsey was born on July 10, 1936 in St. Louis, Missouri. While growing up, Ramsey played softball and volleyball because they were the only sports available to girls in her area. She graduated from Washington Missouri High School in 1955. She received a bachelor's degree from Illinois State University in physical education, a master's degree from the University of North Carolina Greensboro (UNCG) in physical education, and a master's degree from Bradley University in guidance counseling.

Ramsey initially taught for two years at Coolidge Junior High School in Granite City, Illinois, moved to Pekin Community High School in Pekin, IL for six years, where she was also the head of the Girls Athletic Association (GAA.). In 1968 she began a highly successful teaching and coaching career at Illinois Central College (ICC), where she stayed for the next thirty-four years. It was not until later that she became involved with basketball, playing through the Amateur Athletic Union (AAU) and refereeing clandestine competitions for collegiate competitors in central Illinois. In the mid to late 1960s Ramsey was a pioneer for girls' athletics in Illinois. She wanted all girls to have the same chance as boys to play any and all sports. Ramsey's work was influential in getting interscholastic basketball added for girls in Illinois.
