### **Abstract**

Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Thomas Varns was born in 1925 in South Dakota and moved to Springfield, Illinois with his parents at age two. He was drafted and inducted after graduation from Springfield High School. He reported for induction to Fort Sheridan in Northern Illinois and took basic training at Camp Barkley in Abilene Texas. He was assigned to the 415th Medical Collection Company of the 3rd Army and was shipped to the European Theater via Boston to Liverpool, England, crossed England by train to London and from there landed in Holland. His unit followed the 3rd Army providing medical assistance throughout their various campaigns until the war ended. Due to the rapid movement of Patton's army he was seldom aware exactly where they were at any particular time. He did participate in limited combat activities. He returned to Springfield, owned a custom home building company and is retired and living with his wife of over 60 years.
