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Abstract

Robert Fitzer, Agriculture in Illinois/Will to Farm, AI-V-L-2013-006

Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Robert Fitzer was born on his family's farm in Frankfort, Illinois on June 25, 1924. Fitzer's family operated a dairy and raised hogs and chickens on that farm until it was lost in 1933 during the Great Depression. Fitzer's family then relocated to a smaller farm in Plainfield, Illinois where they continued to operate the dairy on a smaller scale while expanding their crop acres. Fitzer married his wife, Jean in 1944 and the couple moved to Joliet where they lived on the same farm that Jean was raised on. This farm is where the Fitzer's raised their three daughters and established and expanded their own farming operation. Fitzer has personally witnessed the transition from draft horses to tractors and from hand selecting seed corn to the development of hybrid seeds. He has actively pursued education about crop and soil improvements and has been a community leader in implementing new technology in agriculture over the years. Fitzer belongs to many agriculture-related organizations, and has served on several boards, including University of Illinois Extension and Will County Farm Bureau. Fitzer is also a founder of the Will County Corn Grower's Association.
