Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Neil Taylor was born on May 9th, 1985 in Decatur, Illinois and grew up in Blandinsville, Illinois. He graduated from Blandinsville's Northwestern High School in 2003. He attended Western Illinois University, and enlisted in the Illinois Air National Guard in May 2005, training as a Tactical Air Controller at Hurlburt Field in Florida. He serves with the 169th Air Support Operations Squadron based in Peoria Illinois (part of the 182nd Air Wing). He deployed to Afghanistan as part of Operation Enduring Freedom in 2010. He and his partner Tech Sergeant John Oliver were assigned to the Company Observation Post at Kalagush in Nuristan Province. Their mission was to provide close air support capability to defend against insurgent attacks. Taylor is a civilian Paramedic and has also served as a volunteer firefighter.
