Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Dr. JoAnn Desmond was born on May 8, 1947 in Chicago, Illinois. She graduated from Resurrection High School in northwest Chicago and earned her B.S., Masters and Doctorate (Educational Leadership) degrees from Northern Illinois University. Desmond started her career as a secondary math teacher, spending nineteen years in DeKalb Unit School District #428 as a teacher and administrator. She first worked as a superintendent in Frankfort School District #157 (1990-95). From 1995-2002, she served as superintendent in the newly formed North Shore District #112. There she worked to create a unified district from three kindergartens through eighth grade (K-8) districts that had differing demographics, including a large Hispanic population, and a military base population. This required a major referendum to improve several school buildings. As a result, Dr. Desmond earned a "Those Who Excel Award" in 2002. For the past ten years, Dr. Desmond has served as a Superintendent of Bannockburn School District # 106.
