Abstract

She grew up in Weatherford, Texas, near Ft. Worth graduating from Weatherford High School. In 2003 she then earned a BA degree from the University of Texas-Dallas majoring in History and Literature with a minor in Education. In 2009 Heather completed an MS in Information Science at the University of Texas in Austin. Currently she is working on her doctorate at the University of Alaska in Interdisciplinary Studies. Heather's early interest in teaching led her to working at three high schools and one middle school located in Texas: Weatherford, Killeen, Carrollton, and Farmers Branch high schools. Heather then worked in the education department at the Lyndon Johnson Presidential Library in Austin, producing education modules incorporating President Johnson's diaries with original records & documents. Later, Heather worked in the Education Division at the George W. Bush Presidential Library in Dallas, and followed that experiences by going to Alaska, where she worked in the field of instructional design while also working on her Ph.D. After five years in Alaska Heather the educational director at the Lincoln Presidential Library.

During this interview Heather discussed the duties and mission of her current assignment as the Education Director at the Abraham Presidential Library. This includes professional development for educators and programs to encourage the use of primary documents. She also designed programs for students and families. Activities available for social studies teachers were covered, and discussed the challenges presented by the pandemic in 2020, especially due to the need to teach remotely since March 2020. Finally, Heather discussed alternatives that were developed during 2020.
