Abstract

Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Arvid Hammers was born in Riga, Latvia in June 1942 to Arvid and Milda Hammers, who owned a small but successful chain and nail factory in the capital city of Riga, Latvia. At this time, Latvia was occupied by the German Army. The Hammers were forced to leave it all behind in 1944 before the Soviet Army occupied Latvia, and with the help of German friends, resettled in a Displaced Persons Camp in Germany. Between 1944 and 1951, Arvid's father worked for the International Refugee Program and several other organizations involved in resettling displaced persons in Germany and working with the refugees in various capacities. The family moved several times over the next few years. The Hammers family emigrated to the United States in December 1951, eventually settling in Chicago, Illinois where young Arvid grew up and attended school. Arvid's father and mother worked in factories or any work they could find.

Arvid attended high school in Chicago and college at Southern Illinois University, receiving a Master of Arts degree in political science. He served as a research associate at the IL Legislative Council and later, as a Public Affairs Consultant for the Youth Network Council for over twenty-five years. Arvid is the father of three children, Theodore, Alexander, and Margot.
