### Abstract

### William Davis, Education is Key-Funding, EF-A-L-2019-052

Biographical Information/Overview: William (Will) Davis was born in Harvey, Illinois in 1968. He attended public schools in the area, graduating from Thornridge High School. Will then attended Southern Illinois University, Carbondale (SIUC), majoring in political science. Upon graduating in 1986, Will worked for SIU-Carbondale as a college recruiter focusing on minority students located in northern Illinois and urban areas. He then became a legislative aide for Congressman Jessie Jackson Jr. In 2003, he ran for state representative. Winning that election, Rep. Davis served the south suburban area, where he still served at the time of the interview. Rep. Davis served as the Vice-Chairman for the Elementary and Secondary Education Appropriations Committee and on the Higher Education Appropriations Committee. He also serves on Labor, Tollway, International Trade and Commerce, and Health and Health Care Disparities committees. At the time of the interview, Rep. Davis was working on his Master of Public Administration Degree at Governor's State University. He is a founding member of the Better Funding for Better Schools Coalition. He served on the foundation board for South Suburban College. He has also been recognized as the "Legislator of the Year" by the Illinois Association of Code Enforcement, the Illinois Primary Healthcare Association, and the Illinois Association of Park Districts. Rep. Davis has represented Illinois at many national meetings regarding school funding reform.

Davis reviews the status of school funding from 2003-2019, discussing challenges in funding for south suburban school districts. He also talks about the various efforts to try to change the school funding formula such as a swap of property taxes for state income tax, revenue neutral taxes to combat the Robin Hood effect, and increasing the foundation and poverty grant levels. He also discusses the near-passage of a New Evidence Based Model (Senate Bill 1). Its failure led to SB 1947, which passed in a bipartisan vote in 2017. This new funding formula, which includes twenty-seven categories, is of interest to school districts across the nation.
