# Mark Plummer, Historians Speak, HS-A-L-2008-045

**Biographical Information Overview of Interview:** Mark A. Plummer was born on June 1, 1933, in Seneca, Missouri, and grew up in that small town on the Oklahoma border. He attended the University of Missouri at Columbia for two years and then transferred to Pittsburg (Kansas) State University, where he received the B.S. and M.S. degrees in 1951 and 1952, and became particularly interested in American and Asian history. After serving in the U.S. Army in Europe, he taught high school in Kansas City, Kansas, before pursuing a Ph.D. at the University of Kansas.

A member of the faculty of Illinois State University from 1960 to 1994, Plummer was chair or acting chair of the Department of History on three occasions. His major publications include *Lincoln's Rail-splitter: Richard J. Oglesby; Robert G. Ingersoll: Peoria's Pagan Politician;* and *Frontier Governor: Samuel J. Crawford of Kansas.* He also served as president of the Illinois State Historical Society.

**Subject Headings/Key Words:** Parents; mentors (including Dudley Taylor Cornish and Robert W. Johannsen); sports (including football and coaching); nineteenth-century Kansas and Illinois political history; the history of Japan and China; Fulbright professorship at National Taiwan University, and other trips to East Asian; teaching undergraduate courses and advising graduate theses at Illinois State University.
