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Abstract

Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Paul W. Sweet was born in August, 1947 in Springfield, Illinois and grew up in Springfield. Paul knew at a young age that he wanted to join the Navy and was able to attend navy Boot Camp (basic Training) at Great lakes Naval Training Center between his junior and senior years in high school. Upon high school graduation in 1966, he deployed to Norfolk, Virginia and was soon assigned to the USS Canopus, AS-34, a submarine tender assigned to the Atlantic fleet and operating out of Rota, Spain. Sweet spent six months working in the galley as a mess cook. He then became a damage control firefighter.

He finished his enlistment in 1969 and came back to the Springfield area, where he enrolled in Lincoln Land Community College, majoring in architecture and engineering. He soon found employment at the Illinois Department of Transportation, working in the Bureau of Bridges and Traffic Structures office. In 1976 he joined the 3637th Maintenance Company, an Illinois Army National Guard unit, based in Springfield. In 1980 he transferred to the 183rd Fighter Wing in the Illinois Air National Guard, where he worked in the Civil Engineering section. During his many years in the 183rd, he went on many deployments, including Templehof Air Base, Germany in 1989, Reykjavik, Iceland, a ninety day rotation at Prince Sultan Air base in Saudi Arabia in 2000, and Incirlik Air Base, Turkey in 2002. He retired from the National Guard in early 2002. In July 2008 he joined a group of New Berlin citizens to begin planning for a veteran's memorial for the town. The memorial was dedicated on July 6, 2013.
